# 2023 - 2024IMPACT REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY



### Our Why

A Year of Resiliency and Growth. The Foundation remains uniquely positioned to bridge the gap between need and possibility—amplifying the school district's goals and ensuring every contribution makes a measurable difference to elevate student achievement, foster community engagement, and support teachers and staff. The 2023-2024 school year stands out as a testament to the strength of our partnerships and the unwavering dedication of our community.

This year, with your support, we raised an impressive \$4.1 million and secured 19 competitive grants and contracts totaling over \$789,000. Our signature events—Golf FORE Education and A Night of Impact—generated a record-breaking \$331,421, reflecting the enthusiasm and generosity of our donors.

Our Seminole Resilient Community Project took center stage this year with over 2,200 SCPS staff, students, and guardians trained in critical resiliency skills. Through these and other programs, we made a positive impact on student behavior and academics, and teacher satisfaction.

Key highlights of the year include:

- A 5% increase in teacher visits to Tools 4 Seminole Schools.
- Awarding 63 senior scholarships and expanding our Take Stock in Children program.
- Allocating \$216,000 toward classroom grants and endowment funds aligned with SCPS priorities.
- Strengthening our digital presence with the launch of our LinkedIn page and a 75% increase in Facebook visits.

These successes underscore the collaborative spirit that defines our work. As we celebrate these milestones, we remain energized by the opportunities ahead to enrich the lives of students, empower educators, and strengthen our "A" rated school district.

### Grants for Great Ideas

The Foundation for Seminole County Public Schools offers the Grants for Great Ideas program, empowering teachers to turn innovative concepts into impactful educational experiences. Teachers can apply for grants of up to \$1,000 for individual classroom projects or up to \$2,500 for grade-level or school-wide initiatives in English Language Arts, STEM, or Arts.



In the 2023-2024 school year alone, the Foundation distributed over \$73,000 across 47 projects, benefiting nearly 13,000 students. One inspiring initiative was a garden project at Lake Orienta Elementary where students not only learned about planting but also formed lasting friendships. One

These grants enable teachers to provide memorable experiences that go beyond traditional classroom instruction. For educators eager to make a difference, the Grants for Great Ideas program is a vital resource to bring their great ideas to life.

### **Creating Pathways to Careers in Healthcare**

Jobs in healthcare are not only high-demand, but also provide competitive wages. Seminole High School operates the Academy of Health Careers (AHC) to provide students with hands-on training for future careers in healthcare. The program had outdated equipment and needed funding to revitalize the curriculum. The Foundation secured several grants to help revitalize the program and renovate the classrooms. The refresh modernized the health academy with new state-of-the-art training tools and equipment and new spaces designed to give hands-on training to the next generation of healthcare workers. The updated program allows students to have personalized experiences, ensuring that they graduate with the skills to enter a workplace that is experiencing a nationwide nursing shortage.

When asked about the hands-on training received in the program, AHC senior Makenna shared, *"It's invaluable. You can't get (hands-on training) anywhere else at this age and so I'm just really grateful that I get to do that sort of thing because you just don't know until you try it.* 

### **Building Resilience**


In 2023, the Foundation launched a groundbreaking initiative aimed at fostering resilience and mental well-being across our community. With state-awarded funds, we partnered with the Peace and Justice Institute (PJI) to implement a comprehensive program designed to equip students, teachers, parents, and community members with the tools to thrive in the face of adversity.

Resilience, the ability to adapt and grow despite challenges, is vital to fostering healthy relationships, academic success, and personal growth. Through this initiative, over 2,200 participants engaged in workshops, youth summits, and professional development sessions tailored to create nurturing, supportive environments within schools and homes.

At the heart of this effort were 84 events, including workshops and five student summits. The summits provided students with leadership and communication skills, while workshops for parents, teachers, and community members emphasized strengthening relationships and fostering supportive environments. One parent of an eighth-grader shared, "This workshop allows us to have better conversations with teens and gives us tools we can actually use."

Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with participants highlighting the practical tools and insights gained. By empowering individuals across the school community, the program is already driving improvements in student behavior, illustrated by a 12% reduction in students with discipline referrals at participating schools.

We are proud to have led this impactful initiative.



#### Key components of the program included:

- A multi-tiered resiliency curriculum aligned with the Florida Department of Education's Resilience objectives.
- Teacher, staff, parent, and student training at five secondary schools, with six workshops offered per site.
- Monthly mental health webinars and inperson workshops for parents and community members.
- Day-long professional development retreats for district mental health counselors, social workers, and school psychologists.
- Partnerships with community groups supporting at-risk students.

### Take Stock in Children





Take Stock in Children is a vital program aimed at breaking the cycle of poverty for low-income students through education. Targeting 8th grade students in Seminole County who qualify for free or reduced lunch and maintain a GPA of 2.5 or higher, the program offers comprehensive support throughout high school and into college.



Throughout high school each student is paired with a volunteer mentor who meets weekly to provide guidance. They also receive assistance from a College Success Coach to help design a personalized college success plan. Upon graduation, each student receives a Florida Prepaid College Scholarship.

During the 2023-2024 school year, 107 high school students were supported by this program. As one past student remarked, **"Some students really need someone to talk** to and to give them great advice, to push them further, and to like never give up even when it gets hard."

This sentiment highlights the program's mission to provide crucial support and encouragement, empowering students to overcome challenges and pursue their dreams. Through Take Stock in Children, students are not only equipped with educational opportunities but also the mentorship, relationships, and resources necessary for long-term success.

### **Tools 4 Seminole Schools**



In Seminole County, many teachers spend over \$500 of their own money on classroom supplies, a challenge compounded by the fact that more than half of the student population qualifies for free or reduced meals. To address this critical need, Tools 4 Seminole Schools was established to collect and distribute essential school supplies and materials, alleviating the financial burden on teachers and low-income families.

Since opening in 2010, Tools 4 Seminole Schools has hosted over 31,000 shopping visits and distributed more than \$20.3 million in supplies, including over 243,000 books and nearly 2.2 million pencils. In the 2023-2024 school year alone, the store provided over \$1.7 million in essential products.

The program is funded through The Foundation and supported by grants, corporate contributions, individual donations, and an annual supply drive. Community involvement is crucial, with local businesses and organizations coming together each year to collect thousands of school supplies. "The relief the parents have when I hand them a backpack filled with supplies on the first day of school, the moms cry and will hug you, and they are so appreciative of what we do."
